# Improvement Academy /////

This month's spotlight falls on the great work with our colleagues in Northern Lincolnshire. We are taking a further look at the Mortality Case Record Review, our CARS project and the Gold Quality Improvement Training. Lisa Hilder, from North East Lincolnshire CCG highlights the benefits of being an Improvement Fellow.

#### Mortality Case Record Review - Northern Lincolnshire and Goole NHS Foundation Trust

All hospitals in England are under pressure to review deaths, safety and quality of care. The Improvement Academy is supporting Trusts to use a shared, evidence-based review method called Structured Judgement Review and this is now the basis for the new national mortality review programme.

Jeremy Daws, Head of Quality Assurance, who is also an Improvement Fellow, shares his thoughts: "The Trust has been working with the Improvement Academy and Professor Hutchinson for 12 months now. The review approach itself is unlike any mortality review process we have used before and it has been well received by clinical staff undergoing training and then undertaking review of actual cases. I think this is largely due to the fact that the methodology harnesses their clinical skills by seeking their judgement on the quality of care. Whilst subjective, this is also hugely powerful and provides us greater context for planning next steps/action needed. Importantly it also reflects the excellent/good quality care provision and is not simply focussed on areas for improvement. We look forward to seeing what the new collaboration with the RCP looks like and how the national approach to mortality compliments the work already invested within the Trust".

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Would you like to help improve patient safety at this Trust?

North Lincoinshire & Goole NHS Trust is involved in a 2 ye project with the University of Bradford and the Yorkshire Humber Improvement Academy, to develop a 'Computer-Aid Risk Score'.

This is being developed to help staff to quickly identify patients who may be severely poorly and in need of additional care.

Northern Lincolnshire and Goole NHS Foundation Trust is working with the Improvement Academy on a Health Foundation project, led by the University of Bradford to develop, implement and evaluate the impact of a novel real-time Computer-Aided Risk Score (CARS) to support clinical decision making. The Trust will be testing the score which combines routine blood tests with National Early Warning Scores (NEWS) and working with the Improvement Academy to embed the score into routine clinical practice. As part of the project, the research team is working with Trust Patient Experience staff to organise focus groups with members of the public who will feed in patient perspectives on the CARS score and how it is being implemented. The CARS work is We are looking for members of the public with an interest in services at Grimsby Hospital, to participate in our study by attending a <u>focus group</u> and give their views on what this score could be mean for patients and how it could be used most

#### Gold 'Train the Trainer' Quality Improvement Programme

The Improvement Academy has delivered the third wave of our Gold 'Train the Trainer' programme. This two day competency-based training is designed to provide trainees with the knowledge and materials to deliver the Improvement Academy Silver Level Training for teams and to mentor and support staff who have chosen to undertake Quality Improvement projects. Recruitment to the Gold training is managed through our QI Training Advisory Group (QITAG) and to date 20 people have completed the course, including 2 Gold Trainers in Northern Lincolnshire.
