A Framework for the Measuring and Monitoring of Safety

Inspiring Improvement Sheffield is collaborating with us on this exciting Health Foundation funded project. A Sheffield based project manager will be testing the impact of the Charles Vincent's framework in STHFT and we'll be sharing their learning at a national level. As part of the Yorkshire and Humber's Patient Safety Collaborative (PSC) - our dedicated acute trust PSC is now meeting quarterly. Representing Sheffield at our meeting in May was Andrew Scott (Patient Safety Manager). Improving Patient Flow within Emergency Departments

Professor Suzanne Mason from STHFT is leading an Urgent Care project investigating whether senior doctor triage improves patient outcomes and flow within Emergency Departments (ED) .

The findings from visits to each ED in Yorkshire and the Humber, combined with data such as attendances and quality indicators have been shared at a well-received regional round table discussion. For the first time, we have a useful picture of all our ED services.

Next steps in the project are focussed on the testing of evidence based interventions within 2 EDs including STHFT with Professor Suzanne Mason. You can read more about this collaboration here.

Mortality Case Note Review



The Improvement Academy, has developed a systematic, evidence-based mortality case-note review process and Sheffield Teaching Hospital Foundation Trust has been a forerunner in collaboratively developing this work. A total of 93 of their clinicians have been trained to date. The work at Sheffield now includes testing this process to analyse cardiac arrests.

Sandi Carman (Head of Patient and Healthcare Governance) and Andrew Gibson (Deputy Medical Director) sit on the Mortality Steering Group. Sandi told us "The Mortality Case Note Review Initiative has had an extremely positive impact on the existing mortality work at Sheffield Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. It has brought a standardised approach to training and helped bring focus to our weekend mortality work."

The Improvement Academy has been working with colleagues from around the region to develop a portfolio of Ol training and development opportunities.
