



SEA is for Safety — Working with our CCGs

As part of the Yorkshire & Humber Academic Health Science Network (AHSN) Patient Safety Collaborative, the Improvement Academy has been working with CCGs from across the region to improve Medicines Safety.

The programme provides a set of resources to enhance the effectiveness of significant event audit (SEA) in primary care by embedding Human Factors theory into a standardised review process involving both General Practitioners and Pharmacies. 40 delegates from 11 of our 22 CCGs have already participated in the scheme and the programme consistently receives positive feedback.
